

COVID-19 POLL Only 35.5% of Indians think the Coronavirus

The Team CVoter Corona Tracker Economy Battery (Wave 3) survey conducted in May 2020 asked respondents

about their view of the effect of the Coronavirus crisis and lockdown on their economic condition. The survey included questions on respondents' viewpoint on the implementation of the lockdown, the relief package announced by the government as well as fear of not being able to afford medical care, food and job loss.












